About the Workshop

Designed as a six-day laboratory of artistic exploration, the workshop combines interdisciplinary techniques, composition, visual dramaturgy, and artistic research. Daily sessions (10 AM-4 PM) will include masterclasses, group work, and knowledge exchange in a multicultural setting. Selected participants will benefit from mentoring by renowned dance professionals and gain tools to deepen their creative processes.
