For the first time, the UNESCO Creative City of Media Arts Karlsruhe is opening its Project Funding Program to international artists and media professionals, inviting global talents to push the boundaries of media art. This is an opportunity to become part of a global network of media artists and to celebrate the diversity of cultural expression.

What is it about:

The 2024 Project Funding Program aims to support innovative media art projects that are designed for outdoor spaces and offer high visibility to the public. The program provides financial support up to €40,000 per project and is open to global applicants for the first time. This initiative promotes international collaboration and the celebration of diverse cultural expressions. This initiative is aimed at creatives who deal with current social and cultural issues and make use of the potential of media art. International exchange, co-operation and





interdisciplinarity are the focus of this call for proposals.

Residency Offer:

Selected projects will be funded with up to €40,000 and will be featured in the Media Art is Here exhibition in summer 2025. The city of Karlsruhe is investing €100,000 in this program to support impactful media art initiatives.

Application Details:

Applications must be submitted via the online application form. Please review the guidelines available on the project's website before applying. The expert jury will select the projects, with notifications sent by the end of October 2024.
